A 32-year-old man who worked odd jobs his entire life is now an operator in a chemical plant earning \$45,000 a year with full benefits. An 18-yearold woman who struggled through high school, just made the Dean's List and is on her way to an associate's degree. A 35-year-old single mother who used to work in fast food is now a carpenter, earning three times her former salary.

These men and women – and thousands like them – converted their raw talents into marketable skills. How? By attending one of Louisiana's affordable, high-quality community or technical colleges. Our schools aren't the quiet alternatives to a university you might think they are. Community and technical colleges today are powerhouses of productivity, providing leading-edge education and helping to train the region's new workforce.

For some students, our schools are the first step toward a four-year degree. For others, they are the catalyst for a new career. All the while, community and technical colleges are vital partners to business and industry, ensuring that as Louisiana's workforce needs change and grow, there is a steady flow of trained men and women to fill jobs.

It's been nearly a decade since the Louisiana Community and Technical College System formed, bringing community colleges and "trade schools" under one umbrella, and sharpening their overall focus. During our short tenure, we have made significant strides.

Here are a few examples:

- a Enrollment in our schools has jumped 12% across the board.
- a More than 14,000 men and women have enrolled in our free statewide Pathways to Construction program, which provides participants a lifetime of stable work while simultaneously addressing the storm-torn Gulf region's dire workforce shortage.
- a To address Louisiana's dearth of health care professionals, we now offer quality nursing programs within every technical college region and in most community colleges.
- a Our schools have raised millions in private funding, enabling them to provide scholarships, expand programs and curricula, and recruit faculty.
- a Our schools have also formed formal partnerships with business and industry. These partners participate in curriculum development and provide many of our students with practical experience.
- a Every community college or technical college region now features Dual Enrollment Programs, in which qualified high school students can take college credits during their junior and senior years.
- a Our schools have provided millions in free or low-cost training to businesses for their employees to ensure Louisiana is competitive.

When Baton Rouge Community College opened in 1997, officials planned for 700 students. More than 1800 showed up, and enrollment has increased steadily ever since. In its short tenure, the dynamic institution has added state-of-theart facilities, including a student center, a performing arts pavilion, an enclosed parking garage, and a science building. More are on the horizon.

BRCC offers nearly 20 degrees and certifications. With its small class size, easy access to instructors and student-friendly campus, high school graduates feel comfortable launching their college career here. Other students, especially those looking for a career change, are drawn to the school's accelerated, hands-on programs and top-notch equipment.

BRCC's curricula have been designed to complement regional job opportunities. For example, because of ongoing workforce shortages in health care, manufacturing and construction, BRCC has developed programs like the associate of science in nursing (ASN) degree, which allows graduates to sit for the Registered Nurse licensing exam within two years. Similarly, BRCC's successful Process Technology program (PTEC) has trained hundreds for stable, full-time work as operators in the chemical industry. And the special Pathways to Construction program, developed after the hurricanes of 2005, provides free long-term training to almost anyone interested in a construction career.

Launched in 1967 with just eight instructors and 101 students, Bossier Parish Community College, commonly called "Bipsie," offers a true college experience for thousands of men and women. The updated, 71-acre campus in Bossier City, features popular programs in liberal arts, allied health, criminal justice, theatre, business and computer sciences and more.

BPCC is serious about helping students find the path to meaningful employment. A leader in workforce training, the college is a hub for adult skills assessment. It also features a special program called Project MOMs, which has helped more than 1,000 single mothers go back to school.

BPCC is known for its telecommunications division, a unique program that prepares men and women for work in television and film. Students train in broadcasting, photography, sound recording, sound editing, set design and motion capture animation (MOCAP), the technique used in movies like *Spiderman* and *The Polar Express*.

BPCC's foray into film-related curricula was no accident. Thanks to motion picture tax incentives, more movies are being made in Louisiana now than ever, many of them in the Shreveport-Bossier area. Many of BPCC's graduates land jobs on film crews, further bolstering Louisiana's identity as "the other L.A."

Delgado's strong culinary arts program provides local hotels and restaurants a steady flow of trained workers – an important component in the city's recovery.

Delgado is thriving.

Founded in 1921 through a gift from New Orleans philanthropist Isaac Delgado, Louisiana's oldest and largest community college serves students across ten parishes. Over the years, Delgado has prepared thousands of men and women for the future, while simultaneously enriching the world around it. During World War II, the school trained woodworkers, metalsmiths, and aircraft mechanics. Today, it's training a new generation of nurses, construction workers, and hospitality industry staff to help the area recover.

Hurricane Katrina wreaked havoc on greater New Orleans and Delgado itself, displacing faculty and students, destroying buildings and interrupting the regional economy. But enrollment at the college in the months after the catastrophe succeeded expectations, and plans are underway for state-of-the-art enhancements to the historic campus.

Delgado and Louisiana Technical College Region 1 schools function under the same umbrella to offer students a network of campuses and degree options. LTC's exemplary programs include an associate of applied science degree, technical diplomas, certificates of technical studies and technical competency certifications in more than 30 fields. New Orleans area employers are partnering with LTC Region 1 campuses to provide a seamless transition for graduates.

At the Louisiana Technical College, Region 3, it's sink or swim. Literally.

Two of Young Memorial's most popular programs, Commercial Diving and Marine Operations, draw students from all over the country who want careers offshore or on inland waterways. Students complete both classroom work as well as several real-world simulations. The campus features an Olympic-size pool and state-of-the-art equipment.

That's critical, because safety and preparation are a must in offshore work. Commercial Diving students don 30-lb. helmets and enclosed suits and practice what it's like to work on oilfield equipment underwater. Marine Operations students test their skills in piloting watercraft under treacherous weather conditions at the school's bridge simulator. And because it believes students should be prepared for worst-case scenarios, the college also features a downed helicopter simulator, from which students practice escaping.

From heavy metals to precious metals and everything in between, the Greater Acadiana technical colleges provide students unique educational opportunities. Schools in the region offer practical nursing, aviation maintenance technology, barber-styling, jewelry manufacturing technology, surveying and mapping technology, the care and development of young children, culinary arts and more.

The schools' partnerships with industry leaders enhance how students learn. For example, Lafayette-based Stuller, Inc., an international manufacturer and distributor of jewelry and jewelry-related products, assisted with creating the jewelry manufacturing technology program - the first in the state. And Begneaud Manufacturing, which produces specialty sheet metal products in Lafayette and Scott, provides Region 4's welding programs materials and equipment. The company also invites students and instructors to the plant for job shadowing.

All of Region 6's welding faculty members are nationally certified instructors and many are also welding inspectors. Graduates have such a high degree of welding skills that they've helped a national tank car manufacturer far exceed projected productivity.

The Louisiana Technical College Region 6 offers training in a variety of highly marketable professions, including practical nursing, office systems technology, HVAC and more. Its popular, well-regarded welding program has not only helped hundreds of people secure stable jobs with benefits, it's also been a lynchpin in the state's economy. Welders are crucial to Louisiana's ability to lure new manufacturing facilities and to rebuild after hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

In fact, LTC Region 6's welding program helped convince national manufacturer Union Tank Car to build a \$100 million facility in Alexandria. The company needed a steady flow of trained welders, so LTC's experienced, certified faculty expanded their longtime program to accommodate the needs of the company. Today, LTC graduates have been so productive that Union Tank Car is able to complete 80-90 freight cars a week, 10-20 more than the company projected.

The Industrial Instrumentation program attracts students nationwide and from around the world. The job placement rate for graduates exceeds 95 percent.

The campuses are key players in the economic development of their respective communities, partnering with local business and industry to ensure a pipeline of trained workers. Region 8 offers degree and certificate programs in nursing, commercial vehicle operations, automotive technology, welding and more. It has also attracted hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants and private partnerships to enhance programs and curricula.

For example, the new Career Pathways Program in Information and Communication Technology, funded by the National Science Foundation, provides IT training to LTC students, local high school students, and secondary and postsecondary faculty in the region. The point is to prepare students for careers in computers while simultaneously training faculty, who will provide the IT training in years to come.

Region 8 also serves as the Northeast Louisiana Construction Center of Excellence, one of several hubs around the state that offers free, short-term training through the Pathways to Construction program.

The Toyota Technical Education Network training program provides students 640 hours of work-site education at a Toyota or Lexus dealership. They transition seamlessly into jobs and their new employers save \$20,000 in training.

Louisiana's first technical college was established in 1930 in Bogalusa when local citizens came together and funded programs in auto mechanics and woodworking, two skills the town needed. The tradition of responding to the community's workforce needs continues today at the Louisiana Technical College Region 9 campuses.

In a partnership with the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA), the Florida Parishes Campus trains new and experienced miners. Region 9's three excellent practical nursing programs have produced top notch students, including a gold medal winner at the SkillsUSA Championships, which showcases the best career and technical students in the nation.

The Hammond Area Campus partners with Toyota to provide area dealerships a steady flow of qualified technicians. Students enrolled in the Toyota Technical Education Network (T-TEN) training program complete rigorous laboratory and classroom instruction and more than 640 hours of work-site education at a Toyota or Lexus dealership. The intense program is the equivalent of two years of Toyota work experience. At the end, students land jobs, and employers save more than \$20,000 in training.

Nunez's stellar PTEC program matches young adults with good-paying, stable jobs. Companies are so eager to hire Nunez grads that many provide full-ride scholarships.

With degree programs in Process Technology, EMT, Construction Technology, Early Child Development and more, Nunez has forged an impressive comeback after St. Bernard parish's direct hit from hurricane Katrina. The first floor of every building on the Nunez campus experienced seven feet of flood water and it took months for utilities to return to the area. Incredibly, school officials still managed to host classes offsite in the weeks just after the storm, so that students could continue on their academic path.

The popular Criminal Justice Associate Degree program allows students options of corrections or law enforcement concentrations designed to meet the Acadiana region's workforce demands. Graduates can immediately join the workforce or continue to work toward a bachelor's degree. The popular Industrial Technology Program trains students in computer graphics, simulation, modeling, business organization, management, and problem-solving.
