Recommendation: Staff recommends the Board approve the following revisions to allow the program to be offered up to 100% through distance education technology.

Program Revisions to be Delivered 100% through Distance Education Technology

- 1. Associate of General Studies (AGS) (CIP 24.0102) TRANSFER
- 2. Certificate of General Studies (CGS) (CIP 24.0102) TRANSFER

Program Addition

1. Associate of Applied Science degree (AAS) in Criminal Justice (CIP 43.0104) - 4 **STARS**

Background: LDCC requests to provide these programs in an online modality with no differences between the program being delivered in the traditional delivery mode and online. Introducing these programs in an online modality will provide access, availability, and flexibility to students unable to come to campus. This revision to the program helps with increasing enrollment and completion. The ability to offer a path towards a degree by attending classes online, a degree for both college transfer and for workforce development, would allow LDCC to address the educational and professional needs of our constituents in a manner that is cost-effective to the institution. Additionally, this method of delivery would allow LDCC to tap into a larger market for online degrees, potentially attracting students from around the country.

Additionally, LDCC requests approval to offer a new degree in Criminal Justice. This program would provide a workforce to law enforcement agencies in the northeast portion of the State and provide opportunities to individuals who want to begin a career or further their career in the criminal justice related industry. The local law enforcement and corrections agencies have consistently voiced concerns about the lack of a quality workforce and their constant turnover. To help address these concerns, LDCC would like to offer an Associate's of Applied Science Degree in Criminal Justice. This offering would provide a more knowledgeable workforce for their entry level positions.

Fiscal Impact: One additional adjunct faculty member will be hired to teach SPCM 110—Fundamentals of Speech and/or SPCM 120—Introduction to Public Speaking classes online for the General Studies programs.

LDCC currently offers an AALT degree in Criminal Justice, as well as a General Studies degree with a concentration in Criminal Justice, thus the cost of the new degree program would be nominal at best.

History of Prior Actions: There is a history of offering programs to meet student and workforce needs.

Benefits to the System: These revisions will allow LDCC to better meet student and workforce needs.

This is the current curriculum for the AGS and the CGS degrees in their current face-to-face and compressed video delivery formats. There will be no change for the modification proposed. For the AGS, the student must complete 18 hours in a major concentration and 9 hours in a minor concentration chosen from the following 5 areas: Arts and Humanities, Social/Behavioral Sciences, Natural Sciences, Business, and Applied Sciences. There are enough courses offered online in arts and humanities, social/behavioral sciences, and business to complete 18 hours in a major concentration area, and enough courses in all of the five areas to complete a 9 hour minor concentration.

Currently, the only requirement for the AGS degree which is $\underline{\text{not}}$ offered online is speech (either SPCM 110 or 120).

LDCC would like to offer our current Certificate of General Studies (CGS) and Associate of General Studies (AGS) degree via an all-online mode of delivery. Currently, all but one of the general education courses needed for the certificate and degree are offered online, and enough electives in several areas of concentration are also offered online, allowing students to choose various major and minor concentrations. The only requirement for the degree not currently offered online is speech, SPCM 120 or SPCM 110. Adjunct instructors with the credentials to offer one or both of these courses have been located, and once the plan is approved, the final required course will be offered online.

Currently, the only requirement for the AGS degree which is not offered online is speech, either SPCM 110 or 120.

Many of LDCC's students work full-time. Many more residents of our region may be interested in attending college to further their educational and career goals except that their work, family, and personal commitments prevent them from attending classes face-to-face on one of our campuses. The ability to offer these current and potential students a way to attend classes and achieve a two-year degree suitable for both college transfer and for workforce development will allow us to address their educational and professional needs in a manner that is cost-effective to the institution. Additionally, this degree would allow us to tap into a larger market for online degrees, potentially attracting students from around the country.

Describe how the program will further the mission of the institution.

Louisiana Delta Community College, an open-admission, comprehensive community college, provides the citizens of northeast Louisiana with affordable and accessible high quality educational programs, services, and modern workforce training. Supported by the Louisiana Community and Technical College System, a dedicated faculty and staff fulfill this mission through their commitment to student achievement, academic excellence, lifelong learning, and the use of current technology. Offering an associate's degree online will enhance the accessibility of our educational programs and our ability to promote both educational achievement and lifelong learning through the use of current technology.

Identify similar programs in the state and explain why the proposed one is needed: present an argument for a new or additional program of this type and how it will be distinct from existing offerings.

Full Associate of General Studies programs delivered 100% online are offered at Delgado Community College and Fletcher Technical Community College. Several colleges in the LCTCS offer hybrid degrees, which is, in effect, what LDCC offers now. Community colleges are, as the name implies, community oriented. Students in our area seldom look further than their local institutions for their educational needs and aspirations. Our geographical area in the Northeast region of the state needs to be able to offer students who wish to earn an associate's degree, but who are unable to attend traditional face-to-face classes, an opportunity for academic and professional growth. An all-online Associate of General Studies degree program at LDCC is

necessary for us to meet those needs in our community.

If approved, will the program result in the termination or phasing out of existing programs? (Is it a replacement?) Explain.

The proposed program is not a replacement for an existing program, nor will it result in the phasing out of an existing program. The proposed program simply delivers current course content required for an approved degree in a different format. In fact, many courses in the AGS program are already offered online. This proposal is to allow an all-online option for completing the AGS degree.

3. Students

Describe evidence of student interest. Project the source of students (e.g., from existing programs, or the prospects of students being recruited specifically for this program who might not otherwise be attracted to the institution).

Enrollment in online classes has risen steadily over the past five years. According to registration records, in the fall semester of 2013, 4,351 students were registered for online classes (includes duplicated numbers). In the fall semester of 2017, 11,706 students were registered for online classes (again, includes duplicated numbers).

Project enrollment and productivity for the first 5 years, and explain/justify the projections.

Year 1: 14; Year 2: 28; Year 3: 56; Year 4: 112; Year 5: 140

The number of students at LDCC pursuing an AGS and/or CGS has remained fairly steady at app. 1,400 for the past three academic years. I began by projecting that 1% of 1,400 students would choose to move to an all-online degree/certificate offering, then doubled the percentage each year until leveling at 10% for the final fifth year. These figures do not estimate the number of new students who may be drawn to the AGS program (above the app. 1,400) due to online delivery of the degree.

For the academic year 2016-2017, there were 1, 420 students enrolled in the AGS/CGS program. There were 51 Associates degrees awarded and 134 Certificates awarded.

Other than gaining admission to the college and completing a tutorial on the use of the Canvas learning system, no preparation is necessary for students to enter the online AGS program

One new adjunct faculty member is needed to initiate the program for the first year in order to offer speech classes online. It is unlikely that more than two new adjunct faculty members total will be needed to address the needs of the new program in the first five years.

Describe involvement of faculty – present and projected – in research, extension, and other activities and the relationship of these activities to teaching load. For proposed new faculty, describe qualifications and/or strengths needed.

Present and projected faculty members must be qualified to teach online and must first be certified to teach online by the Director of Online Learning, Sharon Bowman either by attending an approved preparation course or by receiving appropriate training at another accredited institution. Faculty must attend any ongoing professional development associated with online instruction. Otherwise, there are no research activities associated with the program. New faculty must be qualified to teach speech classes at the college level. They must, according to SACS-COC guidelines, hold a Master's degree from an accredited university and have at least 18 hours of graduate coursework in speech or communication.

Present library holdings, in particular LDCC's participation in the LOUIS Library Consortium is adequate to meet the needs of the

online AGS program. Students will have access to both online and physical library resources, and these resources are adequate for the proposed program.

Indicate/estimate total expenditure for the last two fiscal years in library acquisitions for fields or departments offering or related to the proposed program.

Expenditure for the LOUIS Databases for FY 2016 and FY 2017 totaled \$101,967.70. The online databases would be the primary library source for the online AGS program

No additional library expenditures are anticipated for the first 5 years of the program beyond the yearly cost of maintaining our association with LOUIS.

What additional special resources, other than library holdings, will be needed?

No need for additional special resources is anticipated.

The current General Studies program is largely administered through the Liberal Arts Division, although advising is shared among divisions as students may choose as major and minor concentrations areas from outside the liberal arts and social/behavioral sciences. Online learning is administered through our E-learning coordinator, who answers directly to the Vice-Chancellor of Academic Affairs. As online learning is a large part of the current AGS program, and cooperation among the Division Chairs and the E-learning Coordinator is already an important factor of the success of the program, it is not anticipated that offering the AGS online will affect the present administrative structure of the institution in any way.

Describe departmental strengths and/or weaknesses and how the proposed program will affect them.

The Liberal Arts Division is an extremely diverse group that includes fine arts, humanities, and social/behavioral sciences, and includes a dedicated and highly professional faculty, many of whom are already actively engaged in online instruction. One weakness is that adjunct faculty, sometimes remote from the college and the Northeast Louisiana region, are needed to offer the courses that are required by our students. Offering the AGS as an all-online option may increase the numbers of students desiring to take online courses, thereby providing an opportunity to hire more full-time and part-time instructors with a closer connection to LDCC.

The Coordinator of Online Learning at LDCC, Mrs. Sharon Bowman, is well-versed in all aspects of online learning, having been involved in online instruction at the college from its inception. Further, she is certified as a Peer Reviewer by Quality Matters. Her "Teaching Well Online" course prepares instructors for online teaching by building quality classes using the Quality Matters rubric as a guide. Offering an all-online AGS degree will, it is hoped, lead the college to seek Quality Matters program certification, the standard for quality assurance in online instruction.

The current AGS program is accredited through SACS-COC, and it is anticipated that the online delivery of the AGS program will not constitute a substantive change, although SACS-COC will be notified in accordance with policy.

The current AGS and the proposed online delivery consists of general education courses including English composition, math, natural sciences, social/behavioral sciences, computer information systems, speech, fine arts, and humanities. Areas of concentration, both major and minor, include arts and humanities, social and behavioral sciences, business, natural sciences, and

applied sciences. Thus, coursework needed for the AGS degree come from all subject matter fields at the institution, and instructors from the various academic divisions teach online courses.

This program is an exciting opportunity to provide a workforce to law enforcement agencies and provide opportunities to those people who want to begin a career or further their career in the criminal justice related industry. The local law enforcement and corrections agencies have consistently voiced concerns about the lack of a quality workforce and their constant turnover. These local law enforcement agencies also offer educational incentive pay for their employees. To help address these concerns, LDCC would like to offer an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice. This offering would provide a more knowledgeable workforce for their entry level positions. Specifically, the Monroe Police Department and Ouachita Parish Sheriff's Office have endured numerous retirements within the past several years and have been unable to hire enough officers to get back to full capacity due to the retirements and turnover. Economic Modeling Specialists Incorporated (EMSI) labor market analysis states that nationally 41.5% of the workers within this industry are 45 years old or older; with 20.6% being 55 years of age or older.

Describe how the program will further the mission of the institution.

Addition of AAS degree in Criminal Justice for Louisiana Delta Community College. Surrounding universities (ULM, Louisiana Tech, and Gramling State University) currently only offer 4 year degrees, whereas state law enforcement employment generally only require a 2 year degree. The new degree plans follow the study of the three components of the criminal justice system – Police, Courts, and Corrections. The new degree plan also serves a larger student population, including students interested in non-enforcement activities, such as pre-law and community corrections. The proposed criminal justice electives serve multiple disciplines, not just criminal justice. The new degree plan was modeled after the three component model used at Baton Rouge Community College and degree requirements were modeled after Bossier Parish Community College's degree requirements for an AAS degree in Criminal Justice.
