Background: Delgado Community College (DCC) is requesting to expand their current Surgical Technical program from a Certificate of Technical Studies (CTS) to an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree to address workforce expectations for the contemporary Surgical Technologist. The Surgical Technology program will continue to be accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Program (CAAHEP).

Delgado Community College (DCC) is seeking approval for two new certificates in hospitality management. The proposed programs align with the existing Associate of Applied Science program in Hospitality Management and serve as part of a career ladder, allowing students to gain valuable certifications on their path to the achievement of an Associate degree. Various credential levels allow completers to enter and advance in the workforce while pursing continued educational attainment.

History of Prior Actions: There is a history of revising and creating new programs to meet student and workforce needs.

Delgado Community College proposes a 2-course, 6-credit hour Career and Technical Certificate Program in Hospitality Management.

The Hospitality Management Advisory Board has recommended that the program identify ways to retain students through completion of the Associate degree by creating multi-levels within the overarching instructional program, while recognizing and awarding valuable Industry Based Certifications (IBCs). The purpose of the proposed Career and Technical Certificate (CTC) program is to provide foundational courses, including the Introduction to Hospitality and the Introduction to Travel and Tourism that cover the key skills needed to enter the workforce as well as the key soft skills competencies addressed in the Certified Guest Service Professional (CGSP) and the Certified Hospitality and Tourism Management Professional (CHTMP) designed by the American Hotel and Lodging Association.

The proposed C.T.C. is designed as an exit point, attainable within the Associate of Applied Science in Hospitality Management for all concentrations within the degree. Packaging the courses as a recognized C.T.C. will incur no additional cost to the college, as all courses are existing and are offered on a regular basis.

The College has an existing Associate of Applied Science degree program, with multiple concentrations. The two courses comprising the C.T.C. are used in all concentrations with the existing A.A.S. degree program.

JUSTIFICATION FOR THE PROPOSED CHANGE

Include support such as four-year university agreements, industry demand, advisory board information, etc.

Many positions are available in the Hospitality Industry without a post-secondary degree required. Completers who earn the CTC in Hospitality Management from Delgado will have earned skills necessary for many entry level positions that elevate their options for employment and include two Industry Based Credentials that are recognized by the Louisiana Workforce Commission as "High Priority." The credentials are portable to other Business professional that require soft skills including customer service and conflict resolution usually as a Business elective. The courses comprising the proposed program are accepted for transfer at the University of New Orleans and the University of Houston.

Evaluation of Similar instructional program offerings:

Cornell University offers 11 Hospitality Certificates, which are also available online. University of Massachusetts/Amherst offers 2 Certificates. Niagara County Community College offers 5 Certificates. Madison Area Technical College offers two programs with embedded Technical Diplomas.

The LCTC System, through Our Louisiana 2020: Building the Workforce of Tomorrow, has placed emphasis on the number of completers produced by the system, to include Industry Based Certifications, Certificates, Diplomas, and Degrees; and, since 2009, improved tracking and recognition of embedded/exit point credentials and improved advising models have increased student awareness and participation in programs which are embedded within larger instructional programs (i.e, certificate to degree). Delgado Community College proposes an Associate of Applied Science degree (AAS) program in Surgical Technology. The proposed program is designed to replace the current C.T.S. program in Surgical Technology, and is designed to address workforce expectations for the contemporary Surgical Technologist.

Surgical technologists serve primarily as members of the surgical team. They work with surgeons, anesthetists, anesthesiologists, registered nurses, and other surgical personnel in delivering patient care and providing a safe environment. The surgical technologist assumes appropriate responsibilities before, during, and after surgery. Surgical technologists may also work in other patient service areas such as the emergency room or hold career-related positions such as central service manager, educator, preservation technologist, research assistant, materials manager, or medical salesperson.

The Surgical Technology program will be accredited by the Commission of Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP) (Note, the current C.T.S. program holds this accreditation). Through a selective admission process, two classes will be admitted each year (one in January and one in August). Upon completion of the program, the student will be qualified to sit for the national certification examination administered by the National Board of Surgical Technology/Surgical Assisting (NBSTSA). Enrollment in the program will be limited and is governed by the number of clinical positions available in affiliate hospitals. The Admissions Committee for the Surgical Technology Program reviews and evaluates each application on an impartial basis. The most qualified applicants with the greatest potential for contributing to the profession are selected. All prospective students must contact the Allied Health Division to initiate the application process.

HISTORY OF PRIOR ACTIONS Provide an overview of changes to this program.

The College currently offers a successful Certificate of Technical Studies program in Surgical Technology. Due to changes in scope-of-practice, the College is requesting to expand the program to the Associate degree level. After approval of the A.A.S., and teach-out/transition of the existing the C.T.S., the College will evaluate and determine if the C.T.S. will be maintained or terminated.

JUSTIFICATION FOR THE PROPOSED CHANGE Include support such as four-year university agreements, industry demand, advisory board information, etc.

The Georgetown Center on Education and the Workforce notes that there are tremendous opportunities for Surgical Technologists currently and in the future. Like the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Georgetown's Center on Education and the Workforce notes that growth for Surgical Technologist positions is predicted to increase at a rate higher than normal occupations. The Bureau of Labor Statistics expects a 12 percent rate of growth over the next 5 to 10 years. And, the Center for Workforce and Education notes that several factors contribute to the increased need of highly qualified and licensed Surgical Technologists, to include: a increase in the average human lifespan and rapidly growing ageing population; the development of advances in surgical procedures designed to improve health, appearance, and quality of life; and, the increasing dependence on technological equipment, necessitating a need for Surgical Technologists to ensure and maintain a sterile surgical environment, and to correctly maintain surgical equipment and instruments.

A snapshot of data in Louisiana, noted that in April, 2020, approximately 200 job vacancies were posted for licensed Surgical Technologists in the State's hospitals and surgery centers. The Georgetown Center on Education and the Workforce reports that the salary range for Surgical Technologist in Louisiana range between \$34,000 and \$67,000, depending on experience, level of responsibility, and local labor-market costs/benefits. The average salary in Louisiana is approximately \$50,000. Additionally, the Georgetown Center on Education and the Workforce notes the professional licensure/certification is national, providing Certified Surgical Technologists with a portable credential, which is recognized from state-to-state.

Delgado's existing Certificate of Technical Studies in Surgical Technology was originally approved as a non-designated Certificate program by the State Board of Trustees for Colleges and Universities (now the University of Louisiana System) in October, 1997. The program transitioned to a Certificate of Technical Studies, through approval by the Louisiana Community and Technical College System, in 2009. The program has remained healthy, producing a consistent number of graduates, as follows: in 2018-2019: 22 graduates; in 2017-2018: 17 graduates; in2016-2017: 27 graduates; in 2015-2016: 19 graduates; and in 2014-2015: 22 graduates. Data maintained by the program and verified by the accreditation agency notes that the passage rate on the licensure examination and subsequent employment in the field exceeds national benchmarks. In 2019: 100 percent of graduates taking the licensure examination passed the exam, and 100 percent found employment as Surgical Technologists. In 2018, 96 percent of graduates taking the licensure examination passed the exam, and 95 percent found employment as Surgical Technologists. And, in 2017, 97 percent of graduates taking the licensure examination passed the examination passed the examination, and 100 percent found employment. The College anticipates the same success rates for the proposed A.A.S. degree program.

The core of full-time faculty as all are existing courses, taught at the College on a regular basis. Based on enrollment, additional adjunct faculty may be hired to teach in the program. One faculty member currently serves as program director, with the Assistant Dean of the Division helping with the management of the program's scheduling and fiscal processes.

Delgado Community College has six library locations with the Moss Memorial Library at the City Park Campus serving as the College's main library. The other library locations are the West Bank Campus Library, the Delgado Charity School of Nursing Library, the Delgado Jefferson Site Library, the Delgado Sidney Collier Site Library, and the Delgado River City Library. All Delgado libraries have a shared on-line library catalog. The Delgado library collections contain more than 150,000 print volumes, 920 print journals (serials), 290 microforms, and 3,487 audio-visual titles. In addition to the print collection, the library collections contain more than 350,000 electronic books, more than 76,000 electronic journals, more than 3,000 electronic audio-visual titles, and 129 electronic databases. All campus and site libraries maintain a collection of books, paper, and/or microfilm journals, and a collection of audiovisual materials that are pertinent to the location's curricula. Delgado's print and electronic library holdings are available online in a shared automated catalog system (ISAAC). Books are cataloged in the Dewey Decimal System.

Currently, the Libraries hold 182 monographs (print books), 1,187 electronic books, 325 audio visual resources, and five periodicals (journals) directly related to Surgical Technology. Journal titles include: JAMA, Journal of Wound, Ostomy, and Continence Nursing, Lancet, New England Journal of Medicine, and Medical-Surgical Nursing. In addition, the following databases provide access to full-text and abstracted information resources related to Surgical Technology: Academic Search Complete, CINAHL, Health Source, Medline, ProQuest, Nursing and Allied Health Source. Delgado Community College is a member of the Louisiana Library Consortium, and participates in the inter-library loan system and other resource sharing initiatives. Students and faculty may view resources at other public and private member colleges and universities through a union catalog, and are able to request resources through consortia membership. Currently, no additional resources are required. Regular deselection and acquisition of new materials will be required to ensure the set of physical and electronic resources remain current. Estimated expenditures for new resources are estimated at \$4,500 over a four-year period.

The College has adequate classrooms and office space to house the proposed program. The program has specialized facilities, to include general classrooms and special purpose laboratories, dedicated solely for the use of surgical technology instruction, located on the Charity School of Nursing Campus. Typically, the facilities are in-use for classes, labs, or student work groups between the hours of 8:00am and 6:00, Monday through Friday. All classrooms at the College provide multi-media resources. The Division of Allied Health operates several special purpose computer laboratories dedicated to instructional program offerings within the Division., to include testing and skills reinforcement laboratories. No new facilities are necessary for the proposed Associate of Applied Science degree in Surgical Technology.

The proposed program may be offered at no additional cost to the College. All course are existing and used in the existing Certificate program in Surgical Technology. All required related and general education courses are also existing and are offered at the College on a regular basis. The proposals seeks to combine the professional courses in Surgical Technology, which are all existing, with the General Education core and other related coursework to create an Associate of Applied Science degree
